Just as above, Jesus sternly rebukes the Pharisees for their outward show of righteousness while inwardly they had little regard for God and others
Luke 23:30 "Then they will begin to say to the mountains, 'fall on us,' and to the hills, 'cover us.'	Hosea 10:8 Also the high places of Aven, the sin of Israel, will be destroyed; Thorn and thistle will grow on their altars; Then they will say to the mountains, "Cover us!" And to the hills, "Fall on us!"	Hosea's Israel would face the judgement of God for her faithlessness and so terrible is that judgment that people would cry out to the hills and mountains to fall on them. The judgment of Israel for the death of Christ would bring the same kind of cries.
